Highlights from Year 3 (2022-2023)

- Richfield, Dietrich, and Shoshone School Districts joined the collaborative, bringing our total collaborative membership to eight school districts in southern Idaho.
- Boise State University students continued to inspire and delight middle schoolers with their sharing of personal educational narratives.
- The College of Southern Idaho (<u>Idaho's first federally designated Hispanic Serving Institution</u>) joined as a new partner and offered college mentors for our aspirational workshops.
- HDCC was invited to join BSU's newly established <u>Rural Education</u>
 <u>Collaborative</u> (REC), an initiative to further advance Idaho's post-secondary efforts.
- HDCC conducted 39 aspirational workshops across the collaborative during January and February.

- After hosting eight scholarship review committees, HDCC awarded 201 aspirational scholarships of \$125 to students in grades 4-8 at year-end assemblies.
- KMTV in Twin Falls ran a <u>feature story</u> on HDCC's promotion of 529 Plans with the <u>IDeal College Saving Program</u>.
- The Carey Panthers will join HDCC as our ninth member this coming fall, representing the first school in Blaine County.
- HDCC's official Car of the Year 2004 Subaru Forrester safely navigated
 38 trips down Route 75 and Routes 26/24 in Y3. Hallelujah!


good. I also make coffee cake. That is good with milk. My favorite is my double, chocolate fudge cupcakes with strawberry frosting.
